

Red Oak II Update



Here is an update on Red Oak II for the first quarter 2010:

Route 66 Garage to be moved to Red Oak II

Route 66 runs through Carthage MO along what is now MO 96. In the early days of Carthage, there was a garage along Route 66 that provided service for travelers along the route. This garage has survived the years but was moved off the road and currently is situated behind a tire dealership on MO 96 in Carthage where it is being used to store tires.

Lowell has wanted to move this building to Red Oak II for quite some time as it would be a great addition to his town. Plans are finally moving forward with this with the intent to relocate and restore this building on the lot behind the Red Oak II General Store. It will be used for parking the 1939 Chevy pickup that is being restored for the Red Oak II General Store.

Red Oak MO Early History

Lowell wanted to share with his collectors an account of the early days of Red Oak MO. This is the town from which a number of buildings including the General Store and Blacksmith Shop were rescued and moved to Red Oak II where they were restored and exist today. This account was provided by Euretta Glass in June 1994. We have added some photos that Lowell had in his archives to complement the account.

"Red Oak had three grocery and general merchandise stores in early days. First store was owned by Bushnell Richardson.

The Masonic Red Oak Lodge No. 468, A.F. & A.M. was organized October 17, 1873.

First doctor was Dr. C. J. Overtrez. First post office July 5, 1877 run by John J. Gulick.

Newspaper before 1883.

In 1901 installed telephone switchboard. I.O.O.F. Hall in 1901.

Two churches in early days,

Cumberland Presbyterian and Methodist Church.

La Fore Dealt in goods in 1906.

Chester Griffith was employed at Red Oak store 1912 for seven years. Worked for D. W. Williams owner.

Claud H. Speer and Perry K. Leyerly had the first garage. Enlarged garage 1919. Later owners were David Curry and Clifford Vincent.

In May 1920 D. W. Williams traded the store for a farm owned by Bert H. Baird who became owner of store.

C. H. Speer sold garage to David A. Curry 1920.

Weber Blacksmith Shop owned by William and Adolph Weber, closed the shop in 1920 because of his eyes.

D. H. Vincent owned the mill.

W. A. Clayman owned the feed mill, cabinet shop and barber shop.

Alpha Christman had a harness shop. B. H. Baird traded the Red Oak Store and his residence to Henry Eason from New York for a farm. This was March 22, 1921."

Missoura Kid Bronzes

In the 1990's Lowell had produced two different large Missoura Kid bronzes through Schaefer Art Bronze Casting of Arlington Texas. As Lowell recalls, only two of each of these were cast back in the 1990's and sold in the General Store.

Lowell had been working with Schaefer Art Bronze to try to find the molds for these bronzes so that he could produce additional castings of these two pieces. This winter the molds were found and an initial three additional castings of each of these were produced.

One of the bronzes depicts the Missoura Kid (Lowell) with a sack of chickens over his shoulder and is entitled Quit Your Belly Aching:

Lowell Creating Welcome Sign for Carthage MO

Lowell is working on a welcome sign for the city of Carthage MO. Carthage is known as the Maple Leaf City and it turns all shades of red, orange and yellow in the fall with all the maples that grow throughout the city. To capture this, Lowell is doing the sign in fall colors.

Here is Lowell's color sketch of what the sign will look like:

Lowell Davis Punkin' Pig Bronze

The Little Critters series is one of Lowell's most popular series produced by Border Fine Arts in cold cast porcelain.

Lowell also did bronzes of several of these Little Critter pieces including Punkin' Pig. We recently acquired this bronze for the Lowell Davis Museum and wanted to share it with Lowell's collectors.

Here is Lowell's storyline that goes with the Punkin' Pig piece:

" Fall. I guess it must be everyone's favorite time of the year. Here on our farm especially, fall seems to turn every nook and cranny into a beautiful autumn fantasy. If you slow down enough to enjoy the fantasy, you might see one of my favorite Little Critters. You'd have to get up real early and go out to the punkin patch, the one right by the corn field. While summer is fading away, this little patch is just beginning to come alive. Sit there for a spell as the sun's coming up. You'll see the fog gradually lifting off the field - like a curtain going up on some grand performance. And if you're quiet, you'll hear the rickety rumbling of an old cart - way over in the left hand corner of that field. And if you look hard, you just might see its early morning driver - the Punkin Pig himself."






